

Scholarships

All programs at NZCHE Catholic College of Higher Education are available for scholarship applicants. There are two types of scholarships (1) Full scholarships, and (2) Partial Scholarships.

A full scholarship and a partial scholarship refer to different levels of financial assistance provided to students for their education. Here are the definitions for each:

- St. John Paul II the Great Full Scholarship:
 - This scholarship covers the entire cost of a student's education, including tuition, fees, and often other expenses such as room and board, textbooks, and sometimes even additional stipends for living expenses. Essentially, it provides complete financial support for the student's academic pursuits. Full scholarships are highly competitive and are typically awarded based on merit, academic achievements, or a combination of factors.
- Fulton J Sheen Partial Scholarship:
 - This scholarship, on the other hand, covers only a portion of a student's educational expenses. While it provides financial assistance, the student is still responsible for covering some costs, such as part of the tuition, fees, or other related expenses. Partial scholarships may be awarded based on merit, financial need, or other qualifications.

Both full and partial scholarships are valuable opportunities for students seeking financial support for their education. The terms and conditions of scholarships are usually outlined by the awarding institution or organization, and students should carefully review the details before accepting any scholarship offer.
